ALL ABOARD! LET'S GO! A whole afternoon of food and fun for the enormous price of 65 cents! A 1940 ad from the 75th Anniversary Diamond Jubilee book of Baltimore's St. Martin's Catholic Church donated to Ile Of Kent by Ed Yealdhall of Love Point.

ST. MARTIN'S CAMP

Around 1925 Baltimore's St. Martin's Parish Church, to "provide for the care and recreation of children as part of parish life, ...as cities grow larger and children have fewer opportunities to get out among the green trees and fields of the country", established a summer camp at Love Point on Kent Island. "Only two hours from the city by steamer

it offered the advantages of high ground, a sweeping view, healthy breezes, a young locust tree grove, and was just a half mile from the boat landing. The first campers slept in tents, and cooking was done on an outdoor fireplace of stone. As time went on, a well was driven, drainage added, several small buildings and sleeping shacks constructed."

According to the 1940 description: "The layout now consists of a large dining hall, recreation hall, and chapel, shacks for counsellors and campers, gas for cooking, and electric lights. All this on bought-and-paid- for ten acres of land."

..." The campers sleep on cots provided by the parish but bring their own bedding. Carefully supervised swimming, baseball, basketball, hikes, and all sorts of games are keenly contested and prizes given. In two weeks some children gain as much as five or six pounds. (!) During 1940 the camp was open for the usual eight weeks in July and August with an average attendance of seventy five".

In 1985 the Record Observer/' Bay Times newspapers published a booklet of memories called "I Remember When, a Folk History of Queen Anne's County." On page 49 Ed Yealdhall of Love Point wrote about his memories as a camper at Camp St. Martin's:

Camp St. Martin's was a treat for city kids.

My first trip to Love Point was in the summer of 1935. I had just finished the sixth grade at St. Martin's School, Fulton Ave and Fayette St. in Baltimore. (Editor's note: That neighborhood has changed considerably since 1935.) We boarded buses which took us to the Light Street Pier where we went aboard the

*Smokey Joe", the Pennsylvania Railroad Ferry to Love Point and Camp St. Martin. The

ride took two hours and twenty mintes.

(The camp consisted of a) wooden building, hand pump (for water); no frills like horseback riding or canoe racing- but swimming twice a day, softball, basketball, volley ball, treasure

hunts, campfires, etc. and we loved it.

"An interesting sidelight of this bit of Kent Island History is what it cost us to attend camp. As members of St. Martin's Parish, we paid five dollars a week! This included transportation from ...Baltimore to Camp St. Martin at Love Point and back again. Non-parishioners paid the grand sum of ten dollars a week!

"Camp St. Martin began ..some time in the 1920's and continued until the 1960's. ...it was always staffed by volunteers. In the 1940's when I became a staff member our pay was our food and cigarettes, and, after hours, all the milk...and cookies we could eat.

"Looking back, we realize what a treat Kent Island was for young boys and girls who

livedsurrounded by cement and brick. The closest many got to swimming was when the Fire Department opened the (fire) hydrants for our splashing pleasure on the hottest (summer) days. We have beautiful memories of Camp St. Martin.

"Since we have lived (d) at Love Point, several times a year former campers or staff stop by our home looking (for) the happy place

of their younger days."

Love Point Lover

Ed Yealdhall loved camping on Kent Island so much that in the 1950's he and his family moved permanently to Love Point on Kent Island.

Further testimony to Ed's abiding affection for Kent Island is his Runner Up Entry in a "Maryland You Are Beautiful" Senior Writing

Contest":

"WHY MARYLAND IS BEAUTIFUL TO ME

My true love is water: streams, rivers, bays, oceans. I cannot imagine living where one cannot always see a body of water or be able to walk to water within a short time. Water gives dimension to the space we live in. I like moving water best. Changing of tides, wind, and whitecaps, or at least, rain drops splashing on the surface.

"I fell in love with Love Point in the 1930's. We traveled down from Baltimore via the "Smokey Joe", the Love Point Ferry from Light Street. Our destination was Camp St. Martin. Among our fellow passengers were trucks and truckers bringing supplies to the Eastern Shore to bring back later the marvelous produce, vacationers headed for the Love Point Hotels, and people who were to meet the train at

Love Point and journey to Ocean City.

"I was able to buy my house here (in the) fifties. Not on the water. I saw Camp St. Martin's erode away year after year. I can see the Bay from my house, have the Chester River on two sides, and I have access to the water within two hundred feet. You know the whole of the Eastern Shore is alluvial-dumped after the last Ice Age by a melting glacier. It's all washing away! ...

"I have to go to Baltmore to make a living, but every night it's back to breathe deeply the unpolluted air. Every morning I see the water and breathe the air to keep me alive in anticipation of a return trip that same

afternoon.

"Envy me, but do not try to join me. Too many people keep coming to live on Kent Island. If you are interested in doing so, I'll tell you about the mosquitoes, septic tanks, and vell water!" (Editor's note: The late Julius GrollIman used to say to people who complained about Kent Island: "Remember, that bay bridge goes both ways!")



comments, please let me know.




LIBRARY REPORT

How to use genealogical resources at the



We have had a three busy month period with several for requests genealogical in assistance addition to our participation with the Kent Island Branch Library's series on "Climbing Your Family Tree".




We had two different requests for information regarding families who were forced to leave Kent Island when William Claiborne left. Unfortunately, neither our files nor those in the main library in Centreville, or in the Talbot County Liibrary could provide us with the kind of information needed. We did send a list of other resources where such information might be found.

We received a request for information from Mr. James Russell Clubine of Canada who had been told that there was a possibility that his name had originally been spelled "Claiborne". Unfortunately we have not found that spelling (among many others) in our research but suggested that the Maryland

Historical Society or the Virginia Historical Society or the Archives could give him more assistance. (Ed. note: Soundex Census records might help also.)

Other requests have involved the Carter, Dunn, Gilbert, Hopkins, Hutchison, and Thompson families. We are pleased to have a copy of the pedigree chart of Nancy Nelson Ritchie Overly whose great grandfather was the Rev. Phillip Doderidge Thompson, rector of Christ Church from 1874 to 1892. We could find no genealogical information in either our files, or in those of Christ Church or the diocese of Easton. We did send a photocopy of the page on which his only entry was made. Sadly many old church records are incomplete.

We are pleased to report that we have reached and surpassed our goal of 100 Bible records! We now have recorded the records from 103 Bibles. We are sure there are others which have not yet been copied. If you have one or know of someone who does, please let us know so arrangements can be made to preserve these valuable old records. (Ed. note: Family Bible records frequently take the place of those many missing church records.)

We received an \$11,000 grant from the Maryland Historical Trust to match our \$5,000 plus raised to perform archaeological survey of Kent Island. All funds have been received and the work and reports have been completed by Darrin Lowery. Darrin supplied an article for the Fall 1992 newsletter and an extensive report published in the Bay Times and the Colonial Weekend brochure passed out at Kent Island Colonial Days. His work was found to be of high professional quality by the Historical Trust. As a consequence we expect to be funded for additional work.

Restoration of the depot was completed by Gil Dunn and a host of helpers. If you know Gil. you know he can't sit still. He immediately started renovation of the old meathouse, It's about 90% complete now. Gil is looking for a tenant.

October's Colonial Weekend, though chilly, was very successful. Everyone had a good time watching our "18th Century folks" demonstrate how life was lived without electricity and no TV- an eye opener for the kids. Some of the applicances looked pretty crude, but they got the job done. We had crafters under a tent and in some of Stevensville's empty stores, thanks to the owner for their free use of the space. We hope the new owners allow us the same privileges during May's Kent Island Days for stores that may still be unoccupied.

KENT ISLAND DAYS: May 15th- 16th.



CROSSING THE BAY ON THE "SMOKEY JOE"

(Editor's Note: Thanks go to Ed Yealdhall for his permission to use his writings about Kent Island's Love Point and the ferries for this issue.)


I remember "Smokey Joe", the Baltimore to Love Point Ferry. Hard to say when it started running. Surely it would have been in operation before 1910- because that is the year the Love Point Hotel was constructed. The longest running ferryboat, to our knowledge, was the Philadelphia, which began the run in 1932. My first trip was in 1935 and regularly after until the last run in 1947. The "Smokey Joe" was operated by the Pennsylvania Railroad throughout the year- twenty round trips a week, three a day, with one layover on Sunday night

for maintenance. Passengers traveled on the top deck, indoors or out. Beer, soda, and food could be purchased.



Slot machines were there- penny operated! Cars and trucks occupied the four lanes on the lower deck. I remember the truck drivers shooting craps during the trip. For the 1930's seeing all those ten dollar bills moving around was quite a sight.

My mother liked to pick up bargains from the produce truck drivers, especially those incomparable Eastern Shore cantalopes.

I remember seeing photos in the pilot house of rescues made on the ice of the bay by the *Philadelphia*. One time it is recorded it even broke loose an icebreaker ship which was stuck fast. The heavy flat bottomed boat could ride up on the ice and break through any in its path.

One sidelight, to put our economy in perspective: I remember a Sunday trip in either 1937 or 1938 when we had Sunday dinner at Miss May's, a small hotel, now a private home on Pier Road above the ferry slip. The meal consisted of fried chicken, a soft crab, peas, potatoes, corn on the cob, iced tea and ice cream for dessert. The cost was one dollar!

In 1947 after "Smokey Joe" banked its coal furnaces, I began to drive to Sandy Point to take the ferry to Matapeake on Kent Island. It was a nice twenty minute ride... - but not really the same! (as good old "Smokey Joe")

In Memoriam-

Though not Kent Island born, C. Mitchell Davidson, originally of Carmichael, died recently at age 91. Mr. Davidson spent over 70 years farming on Kent Island, except for a brief period when a family illness took him to Baltimore County.
