No Island anywhere could possibly cast a spell over its people with the magnitude that Kent Island did in my youth. To have been born here along its shores is a distinct privilege that God granted a very few. To have walked the beaches in the early morning, smell the salt air, feel the coolness of the wet sand as it oozed between your toes and watch the watermen as they headed out to tend their trot lines or fish their nets, listen to the sound of their one-lung palmer engines, are but a few of my memories.

To return from a trip to the Western Shore to the Island by means of the Matapeake ferries, whether the John M. Dennis, the Herbert R. O'Connor or the Harry W. Nice or by the Smokey Joe, rounding the Love Point Light, one cannot express the feeling of coming home again. The Island held a fascination like no other place for its people.

To take a skiff out into any one of the creeks, to build a tremendous bonfire and roast hot dogs and marshmallows on one of its many beaches, swim in the Eastern or Chesapeake Bay in the moonlight.

To watch as a farmer plowed his land, the many sea gulls that engulfed the furrows seeking the worms from the freshly plowed earth, to watch the change of seasons on this beautiful Island.

To go ducking on a cold winter's morn, to set out the decoys and wait with patience in the duck blind the arrival of those ducks, while your lungs ached from the cold, the thrill of bringing down that first duck.

To go on a date with one of the many beautiful Island girls, to park at Matapeake or Love Point and watch the ferries come and go, to attend the high school proms and dances, all make you realize how fortunate you were to have been born a Kent Islander, truly a breed apart.

The way of life, the camaraderie of the people, the land and water, all seem to make Kent Island, my Island, an almost mystical place to have grown up.


Announcement was made that the Board decided to reduce the dues to \$5 per person for a period of one year.

The Love Point Light to come to life



Nick Hoxter, our vice president, has been working with Jafar Komeylian of Komeylian Sculpture Line in Stevensville since January of this year in an effort to add the Love Point Lighthouse to his line. Presently, Komeylian has 19 models that are sold in Maryland, Delaware, Virginia and Pennsylvania. In 1996, he plans to have all the Chesapeake Bay Lighthouses on the market.

Nick said he met with Jafar in November to view the model, which will then be in production this December. He will meet with Jafar again this December to assess the colors used on the model.

The first Lighthouse will go to Nick's wife Sharon, who was instrumental in the research and completion of the Love Point Light Painting (by Joseph Hegarty, pictured left) and the model.

We at the Heritage Society think it's a feather in our cap to add this lovely old lady to the fine Komeylian line of sculptures.

"HERITAGE PARK" UPDATE

Billy Denny and Nick Hoxter have been working hard at the Heritage Park at Stevensville. The area where the house set on a foundation has been removed by Norman Wright and back filled with the pile of dirt that sat near the road. All debris was removed (two truck loads), and trees were trimmed. Another load of top soil was needed to completely fill this area and was donated by R.B. Baker & Sons of Queenstown. Many thanks to Baker & Sons... and a tip of the old hat to Teddy Baker.

Ted and Janet Breeding of Stevensville have the given the Kent Island Heritage Society the old restaurant formerly owned by Jute and Marian Hardesty. This building has been sitting on the Breeding Farm since the early 1940's when Ted's father bought it from the Hardesty's. Ted informed us that it was towed to where it now sits by means of a tractor and truck. For many years, it was used as a tenant house for farm hands.


Many old time Islanders will remember it as a Pure filling station, first built between 1930 and 1932, sitting across from Dr. John R. Bentons home on Route 18 in Stevensville. Mr. Sudler Cockey had it built and Mr. Ed Goodhand was the manager. Mr. Cockey's theory was that

this was the ideal location to catch the ferry traffic coming from the Matapeake ferries, which had just commenced operation. For a while, this held true. Then a service station opened on Rt. 18 near Matapeake. Mr. Bill Denny also opened his garage and gas station in the center of Stevensville. With the competition too strong, Mr. Cockey sold his business to Jute and Marian Hardesty who then turned it into a restaurant while still retaining the gas sales. The business closed in the early 40's.

A committee consisting of Billy Denny, Dick Dadds and Nick Hoxter has been appointed to ascertain the feasibility of having this building moved to the Heritage Park at Stevensville and restored to its former self.

When the building is restored, it will be used as a temporary museum to house Heritagr artifacts.
