Since Christmas, the Oral History Committee has videotaped interviews with three notable Kent Islanders.


Melvin Clark was interviewed in December, Mr. Clark is a well-known craftsman of the tools for the waterman's trade. Melvin was born in Stevensville in 1922. He remembers horse and buggies, traveling salesmen and dirt road main streets. With his close connection to the local seafood industry, Melvin watched-and laments-it's decline over the years. He laughs about the way large construction firms were of mixed feelings about hiring Kent Island guys. On one hand they were hard workers, on the other-come oyster season "you're going to lose them."

Mrs. Eva White Thompson was interviewed after the first of the year. Another lifelong resident, Eva is admired by many Kent Islanders for her friendly smile and positive personality. She cherishes music and the memories it provides—from teaching piano to numerous young locals to playing in locations around the world. Her church has been a major influence on her life. 

## April Fools' Day 1965

ooking through a suitcase full of old newspapers and magazines the other day, I ran across a 45-year-old copy of the Centreville Record Observer. Dated April 1, the front-page news was shocking. And provides us something of an alternate history.

The top story was that Richard Burton and Elizabeth Taylor, the Brad Pitt and Jennifer Aniston of their moment, announced plans to build a home on a marsh island off Turkey Point on Cox Neck. This ultra-modern love nest was to include "two indoor swimming pools, a tennis court, a golf driving range, a 28 boat garage and an underground-underwater ailway tunnel to Friendship Airport." Costs for this Eastern Shore paradise were estimated at a thenoutrageous half million dollars.

Another big announcement was "Kent Island Changes Name To Attract More Tourists." Seems the state legislature voted to approve the name change after so many people coming off the Bay Bridge confused us for Kent County. This hip new happening name might have really done the trick, too, as far as those tourists were concerned. After all, who wouldn't want to visit "Bermuda"?

Almost as a sidenote:
"Stevensville School Burns
To Ground." The blaze
lasted 13 hours and was
started by local forest ranger,
Smokey Joiner. Smokey was
demonstrating for an
assembly of students how to
put out forest fires. The high
school fire stared with a
cigarette that Ranger Joiner
forgot to extinguish. Five
hundred students cheered as
the building burned to the
ground.

Kent Narrows was awarded a state commendation for health and hygiene.

Kent Island wasn't the only place such strange events were reported. The Tuesday before, an oil well was discovered under the county courthouse in Centreville and a spaceship

landed in Sudlersville last Sunday night.

At the far right hand bottom of the page there was a notice: "If you have managed to read this far—April Fool!"

On the back page and inside was the real news.

Groundbreaking on the new county high school had taken place. Arch-rivals Centreville and Sudlersville were blasting open the scholastic baseball season that upcoming weekend and there were two big coon dog events scheduled.






When he came back Thursday I asked him where he had been, because I was looking for him.

influence on her life. She believes what makes life fulfilling is to "give of yourself and you'll always receive." As a young girl, she recalls attending Strawberry Festivals, picking peaches on Parson's Island and buying fabric and sewing materials with her mother on a visiting Floating Theater. She went crabbing with her father. When she married and had children, she loved that her home was always a hub of activity.

Mr. Alvin "Babe" Grollman was our most recent interviewee. His nickname, originally "Baby," came from his being the youngest of Henry and Lena Grollman's five children. Henry Grollman was a prominent Kent Island farmer and merchant. Grollman's Store was a Main Street anchor for 74 years. Babe has farmed here all his life. A mischievous little boy, his mother would tell him, I'm not going to whip you, you're going to get your hard knocks outside." And he admits he did. Babe recently lost his beloved wife Irene and speaks adoringly of his six daughters. When the first, Deborah, was due, Irene went back home to her family to give birth. When she left she went over the bay on a ferry. She came home over the bridge. Times were changing.

One thing all three of these distinguished folk have in common is their love for Kent Island. Despite the changes they've seen over their years, they all still believe we live in a special place.

The proof of their opinion is this: A special place nurtures special people. People like Melvin Clark, Eva Thompson and Alvin "Babe" Grollman.


